## + Pastor Anne ~ Quiet Excitement

Grace and peace to you.

We have quiet excitement and hope for the future.

This Christmas will be our son, Nate's, first Christmas of which he will be fully aware. Something good is on its way.

I have a quiet excitement about Advent and Christmas this year; that there will be new traditions to start and old ones to resurrect. I am looking at Advent and the preparation for Christmas in new ways. There is a new hope in our family.

As I write this letter, I note that the movie "New Moon" is premiering tonight. It's part of a popular teen book series. I have been struck by the buzz that this movie has created. Tickets for tonight's show are sold out all over the world. People are debating the merits of the movie. The stars are in interviews all over the media. There is a quiet—or maybe louder—excitement about this premiere. You can almost feel the electricity in the air as people line up at the theatres.



What if we had that kind of excitement about the coming of the Christ child? What if we looked forward to that Christmas morning with that sort of anticipation. Instead of looking at the stuff of Christmas—the buying of gifts, the stress of the season— what if we replaced all of that with some quiet excitement about the coming of Jesus into our world, one who will change our lives, challenge us and gift us beyond our imaginations?

I would like to transfer that sense of quiet excitement to life here at Trinity. We will prepare for the coming of Christ together as well. There may be new traditions begun, such as the Advent mosaic made by our Sanctuary Community or a new Christmas story from our children. There will be older traditions observed anew like those of our mitten tree, Christmas hampers, cheer plates and a Service of Lights, Readings and Carols on Christmas Eve.

It is my prayer that we enter into this season looking forward to the coming of Christ with a measure of quiet excitement; a measure of the wide-eyed joy of one who is not sure of what exactly is coming but with confidence nonetheless.

I think this quiet excitement can carry beyond our Advent season as we keep our eyes wide open to what God is up to in our lives and in our community, searching for where and how God can use our gifts to share the love that was expressed fully in the birth of the Christ child.

May the quiet excitement of the season abide in us well beyond Advent and Christmas and encourage us to live fully in God's love.

### That Yonge Child

It's the spiritual memories, I find, that stay with me most vividly, and this is one such:

It is November, the end of the school day, and I am walking through the corridor to my locker. I am 12 and in Grade 7, still very shy and scared in the big school that the junior high students share with the formidable and just-barely-tolerant senior high students.

As I walk past the music room I hear a girl's voice, very true and clear, and it stops me in my tracks. The song she is singing is unlike anything I've ever heard before. It isn't pretty; it's got a discordant, edgy quality, and its movement isn't rhythmically regular. It pauses and leaps. It's quiet, but it feels like a small wild animal, one with a soft coat and needle teeth. And I find it utterly entrancing — piercing, mysterious.

The song ends, and I head down the corridor, disconsolate. I want to find that song again, and I have no idea how to do so.

For the next few weeks, scraps of the song keep pursuing me, nuzzling up to my consciousness at odd moments, and I grieve the fact that I'd found it only to lose it again. I try to describe it to my musical mother, but she doesn't recognize it from my description. It doesn't occur to me to ask the music teacher at school; I am too intimidated. The music room is holy ground of which I am not worthy.

My parents go off to a concert in December, held by our high school's senior girls' choir, the Harmonettes. A week or so later, it's Christmas Eve, and we're putting up the Christmas tree, something that happens only after dark on December 24th, because before then (my parents are staunch on this) it's Advent. My mother has just bought a new recording, the piece she'd heard at the choir performance, and she puts it on as we decorate the tree.

I am immediately entranced by the music, lovely stuff, performed by boys' choir and harp. And then, there it is, the song I'd heard back in the school corridor, piercing my soul.

That yongë child when it gan weep\*  
With song she lullèd him asleep:

That was so sweet a melody  
It passèd alle minstrelsy.

It would be years before I finally got the composer's point: that sweet isn't necessarily pretty, and that real beauty exists in the angles and the accidentals as well as in C major. But what matters to me in that long-ago Christmas Eve is that I've found my song again. And it's on a recording that we own, in our house. I can listen to it whenever I want. I have a name for it.



Later, in high school, I was in the girls' choir myself, performing Britten's "A Ceremony of Carols." It is not an easy piece, but I loved it. I found other parts of it even more piercingly beautiful and fell in love with them too. I treasured that music in my heart and head. I kept it locked away until after dark on December 24th. Bringing it out and into my full consciousness was the act making Christmas. On Christmas Eve, I would take it out with me into the snow-spangled dark where mystery lurked and there was always the Milky Way, even behind the overcast. It walked with me across the yard into the church next door for Midnight Mass.

Years passed. I always listened to "A Ceremony of Carols" when the tree went up — a bit earlier than after dark on Christmas Eve, once I had children, but still late by seasonal standards. I fought off "the holiday season" in order to keep Christmas itself piercing and mysterious. Even when I was very far from faith, the music bored its way through to my spirit, not every single year, but enough.

Was it that, I wonder, that kept some sort of trickle-through passage open between me and God? Maybe so. It certainly helped. There were other memories of the spirit, too, that never quite vanished off the horizon during those years. I'd had faith and spirituality gently mocked, frozen out, discouraged, and I had tagged along obediently with those who saw faith as — well, silly and old-fashioned and credulous. But yearly, however briefly, I scented mystery again in that music, and knew that there was God.

Last night, it came time to start making Christmas. The shopping's done; I have the tree, and the kids — home from their new lives — will help me put it up tonight. But last night I put the music on and listened to it, eyes closed.

And yes, it still works. Thanks be to God.

## + November Council News

- Council welcomed Jackie Currah, Larry Gravill and Heidi Ziegler to the table.
- Every month, Council sends a number of thank-you notes to people named in the pastors' report. This month, we thanked Mike Gascon & Maggie Racho (support for the TYGers), Dee Radke (for initiating our support for St. George's Bazaar), Lisa Hagen (for the 9<sup>th</sup> Inning assist with Trinity's Confirmation Sunday music), Eric Reble & Bill Huras (for their witness and teaching at adult learning), Christina Vanin (for her presentation at Adult Learning) and Darrin Gueguen and his team (for the installation of four new circulating pumps in our main-church heating system).
- Council heard that Pastor André is substantially back to work. With respect to his heart, his condition will be monitored regularly and should have no effect on his present ministry. With respect to his knee, treatment continues to try to improve range-of-motion. While he is unable to drive, people have been helpful in getting him around.
- Pastors André and Anne are preparing a small community of people to assist in parish visitation. While this will prove particularly helpful while Pastor André is impaired, the program will become a regular part of Trinity's ministry.
- Council approved a major schedule of energy conservation and comfort measures for the Peel and Wilmot Street parsonages. Council also heard that a number of significant main-church property items have been completed or are under way. See facing column.
- If trends conform to those of previous years, we may reasonably expect positive balances in the General and Capital Funds at the end of the year. Of course, that means we all do our best to reflect on our stewardship to date and take account of Trinity's end-of-year needs.
- As we do every year, Council is seeking people who might be willing to serve in 2010. Speak to Lori Arnott to express interest and to learn of our needs.
- Council reviewed a first draft of Trinity's 2010 program budget. As always, Rick Ritz, our point person in such matters, welcomes input.

## + Property Matters

### Parsonage Energy Conservation & Comfort

At the November meeting of Council, a large schedule of parsonage items was approved. The various projects have a total value of some \$20,900. However, the projects will attract federal, provincial and municipal rebates totaling \$8,410 (not to mention additional GST rebates). The estimated total costs are therefore \$12,490 and will be funded through 2009 Capital offerings.



The Peel and Wilmot Street attics will be fully insulated as will the access hatches which will be sealed.

The Wilmot Street basement will be insulated and dry-walled.

Three windows at the Wilmot Street parsonage (living room and kitchen) will be replaced with high-efficiency units.

The toilets at the Wilmot and Peel Street parsonages will be replaced with much more "efficient" models.

The Peel Street water heater (a rental) will be replaced with a high-efficiency in-line unit.

The Wilmot Street furnace (about 18-20 years old) will be replaced with a high-efficiency model and equipped with a (central) air-conditioning unit.

### Main Church Work

Darrin Gueguen and his team have completed the replacement of the four circulating pumps serving the church's (1810 and 1957 wings) two main boilers.

A tank/pump assembly will be installed between Christmas and New Year to evacuate kitchen waste, the source of pronounced malodorous zephyrs (bad smells).

The lower arched steeple openings—the ones with the horizontal slats—will be refurbished this spring by Buck Roth and company. Access is available from the inside eliminating the need for exterior scaffold or a boom truck. A bit of paint should do the trick for the most part.

An access opening between the tower organ pump room and the main church attic has been provided with a door to prevent the collision of warm and cold air and the resulting condensation of moisture in the attic.
