Grace be yours and peace.

Over 160,000 people are dead as an earthquake off the west coast of the Indonesian island of Sumatra triggered tidal waves that brought untold tragedy to South East Asia and parts of Africa. There are estimates of another 100,000-150,000 people who are missing and may die or are already dead. Some 5,000,000 people are homeless. While none of this is news anymore, the impact of the tsunami, in every sense, continues to unfold. So what has our church done?

Our church's Global Hunger and Development Appeal (GHDA) has been receiving funds which are channelled through Canadian Lutheran World Relief (CLWR) <http://www.clwr.org> to Action by Churches Together (ACT). ACT <http://www.act-intl.org> is a global alliance of churches and related agencies working to save lives and support communities in emergencies worldwide. ACT was on the ground in the early hours following the tsunami in Sri Lanka, India and Indonesia.

In a real sense, our church was *already there*. Between December 26 and February 11, the federal government was matching our donations dollar for dollar. In that period, Trinity's members channelled over \$7,000 to GHDA/CLWR yielding some \$14,000 in matched aid. That's in addition to some \$9,400 in Global Hunger support earlier in 2004!

Some perceive the matter of dollar matching to be a one-time reality. The truth is that Canadian Lutheran World Relief works on an *ongoing basis* with CIDA —the Canadian International Development Agency— on all sorts of projects which are *dollar-matched* —often in substantially greater measure than one-to-one!

The community of Trinity Church has been very generous in giving toward disaster relief and recovery, both through the church and through other agencies. We do well, however, to support the *ongoing work* of the Global Hunger Appeal and Canadian Lutheran World Relief because they exercise such great stewardship on our behalf *on an ongoing basis*. They will still be “on the ground”, doing our church's work, long after the tsunami has fallen away from media consciousness and long after many other agencies have departed the scene.

Consider making the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada's Global Hunger Appeal a *regular* part of your ongoing offerings. It's only good stewardship!

Act of God?

It seems I spoke too soon, last week, giving thanks that nobody had called the earthquake and tsunami "an Act of God". All this week we've been going back and forth on the Magdalen e-mail list about the theology of this tragedy.

I've struggled towards a new understanding: that for some people, the disaster is an expression of the fallen-ness of Creation. Like me, they believe that the tragedy is *not* God's punishment of anyone, because a God who would punish innocents for the sins of others is a God of injustice and hatred. For them, it's not that God is punishing humankind for our sins; it's that our sins have so disrupted the fundamental harmony of Creation that tragedy results — rather like a secondary infection, if that makes sense. We, in our Fall, have dragged Creation down with us.

Okay; I can take that notion and walk around it for a while, slamming its doors and kicking its tires. Does it work for me? —because ultimately, while I can cheerfully accept mystery, I can't accept something that doesn't make sense.

A lifetime ago, I did an undergraduate degree in biology, and while I've forgotten much of the details (which are, in any event, hopelessly outdated by now), I still have a touch of the biologist's stubborn pragmatism. I can certainly see the appeal of this, in that it weaves Scripture into Creation without turning God into someone I wouldn't want to get close to.

But it still leaves an itch that won't go away. Let's say that the earthquake/tsunami had happened on a world without living beings —and it's quite easy to imagine such a world. Our world was, in fact, just like that however many billion years ago, after its crust had cooled and the oceans (not, of course, the current oceans) had formed. There would, of course, be all sorts of seismic hoopla going on —volcanoes, earthquakes, tsunamis. Imagine the same event happening.

If we were studying this activity from a safe distance, we would talk about its majesty and excitement and awe. We might talk about its terrible power, but we wouldn't be talking about its being a Bad Thing. We wouldn't need to explain it, theologically, only geologically.

Fast forward however many billion years and have the same event happening in a landscape full of extremely large and weird insects and proto-dinosaurs, without a hint of mammalia. Now, living beings *are* being killed or injured. Would we be talking about tragedy and searching for meaning? Maybe some of us would. But not most. It's hard to muster human pity for a three-foot cockroach.

So what gives the tsunami its theological significance? The fact that a whole lot of innocent people got killed or injured, or lost loved ones and homes and livelihoods. We witness the trauma that the survivors struggle with, the pain in their faces, and the abrupt destruction of their previous lives, without even a minute to say goodbye. That's what we struggle with. That's why we scramble for meaning and reach for our wallets —as well we should.

But I'm with the Buddhists on this one: it just happens. We live on a planet that does periodic bumps and bangs as its constituent plates grind into each other; when a large bump or bang happens in a heavily populated area, it's tragic, the more so when the area is particularly vulnerable, as this area was.

It's not so much the loss of life — we are, after all, largely ignoring the MUCH bigger human tragedy in Africa. It's the suddenness, the out-of-the-blue "one minute it's paradise, next minute it's hell" factor that grabs us. Or was it because so many North Americans and Europeans were among the victims?

I can't see this as an act of God; I can't see the AIDS epidemic that way either, or the Black Death of the 14th century, or Krakatoa. I can't see it as an act of a Creation that has been disordered by its, or our, willful disobedience to God.

I just see it as Nature doing its own thing, without much regard for our happiness or well-being, because Nature is not conscious of us.

(Mind you, if Nature *were* conscious of us, I suspect she'd shake us off her back, double-quick —and we'd deserve it.)

If we want to use this event to improve our consciousness of the rest of the world and to help those in trouble, that's great. That makes God smile, even as God sits with the suffering. It would be even better if we could muster the same generosity and compassion for less dramatic events. In the Congo, 500 children under the age of 5 are dying every day; in Darfur, some 70,000 have died since March. If we can muster compassion for one tragedy, why not for all?

The tsunami is no act of God, unless we chose to make it one—God acting through us to do what God desires: to share with those who lack, to care for those who mourn, to work for peace and justice, and to love even our distant neighbours as ourselves.

The ladies of Trinity's ELW are working again on one of our annual projects—baby layettes for Canadian Lutheran World Relief. Last year we made 30 layettes, each containing two pairs of sleepers; two baby shirts; one knitted sweater; four diapers; two receiving blankets; two face cloths and two diaper pins. We try to get everything through member donations except for the diapers and blankets.

The layettes are put together and each one is wrapped in the hand-sewn blanket, so all are alike, as the flannel for the blankets is usually in a pretty baby pattern.

Our members are finding it more difficult each year to get baby sweaters, and are hoping that some of the knitters in the congregation would each knit a sweater or two for the project—just a plain baby sweater, nothing fancy!

We are fortunate in that Trinity is blessed with a number of terrific and dedicated knitters.

We would ask that those who do not knit, might make donations of sleepers, shirts, blankets and baby face cloths. We would greatly appreciate your help. Wouldn't it be great if we would could equal last year's record of 30 layettes?

We are able to send all these layettes to the head office of Canadian Lutheran World Relief in Winnipeg, free of charge, through the generosity of Home Hardware in St. Jacobs. Larry Taylor, our local dealer, very kindly sees that the boxes are taken to St. Jacobs from here. We are indeed grateful to both Larry and Home Hardware for their help.

✝ Fire & Safety Issues

By the time this issue of TRINITY DOVE is out, work should be well under way on a new fire alarm system with heat and smoke detectors and main-entrance annunciator panel. The system is now required by the Ontario Fire Code.

We have been in conversation with the Day Care Centre as much of the remedial action is related to the number of day care children in our facility. We have confirmation that the Day Care Centre will be eligible for a one-time funding grant toward the project based upon an 80/20 funding split. Trinity's portion will be something in the order of \$5,000.

On November 17, Council accepted a quote from JEM Fire Systems for a project that will (now) begin during the week of January 17, 2005. Originally scheduled for January 10, there has been a delay in beginning the project as the Township required a set of drawings (see the narthex board) provided by a professional engineer in order to issue a building permit.

In any event, the *entire* Trinity facility is being outfitted with smoke and heat sensors, emergency call stations and alarms. An annunciator panel at the entrance will relay information to our existing security system and then to a remote monitoring station for immediate response in case of fire.

The Year to Date

We have had a remarkable year, all things considered. While we have ended the year with some deficits, given the size of some of our unforeseen expenditures, we have done remarkably well!

We have end-of-year deficits in our General Fund of \$6,398 and our Capital Fund of \$1,522. The Capital expenditures include roof and steeple repairs together with the year-end installation of emergency signage and lighting.

Given that we could not have foreseen the steeple repairs, nor the new requirements of the Ontario Fire Code, the accomplishment in the Capital Fund is astonishing. We had an opening Capital Fund cash balance of \$9,576 from 2004 which we have now depleted slightly to \$8,054.

In 2005, we expect major expenditures on the 1956 wing roof and for our share of a fire alarm system. At this early stage, we expect these projects *not to require* any additional appeal to the congregation beyond regular Capital Fund offerings.

The focus for 2005, therefore is clearly on the General Fund.
