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✚ Pastor André ~ New Worship Book

Grace and peace to you.

It's coming soon! Perhaps you've seen one of the posters, the display at church, noticed a flyer on the bulletin board, or heard me mention (at the annual meeting or at worship itself) our new worship book: *Evangelical Lutheran Worship*? The new books will be available in October!

For the last five or so years, I have served as one of the Canadian coordinators of the Renewing Worship Project, the project which has given birth to our new book. It's been quite a journey. Come 2007, *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* will be the principle worship resource for Lutherans in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada and Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

At Trinity, we will receive the new books in October. In November, we shall spend several adult learning sessions becoming familiar with our new book and learning one of the new settings of the Holy Communion. By the end of November, we shall have retired our existing assortment of books and, beginning on the First Sunday in Advent, we shall worship from a single volume for the first time in years. No more flipping from book to book! It's hard to believe, but we have been singing from *Lutheran Book of Worship* (the "Green Book") for almost 30 years! (The new book in "nu cranberry red" or "Habs red" as I like to think of it.)

We are hoping that members of the congregation will help to offset the cost of acquiring our new books by sponsoring them. In fact, by ordering our books before October, we'll get them at a discounted "pre-publication" price of \$21. We're asking people to sponsor one or more books for the pews —We'll need 220 to do the job!— and perhaps to buy them for home use or as a gift at the same time. The new book makes an excellent gift for baptism or confirmation as it will contain *Luther's Small Catechism* in addition to lots of new worship resources and a terrific collection of hymns. An order form and offering envelope are contained in this issue of TRINITY DOVE.

We ask that people get the order form and envelope in to the church office as soon as possible. Books may be given in memory or in honour of loved-ones and a bookplate to that effect will be placed in the book.

I plan to honour Kim in this way by providing the two

presiders' editions —a handsome altar copy for use at worship and a ministers desk edition for use in the study— to the congregation while Gywin & Jim Murray will be providing the two musicians' accompaniment editions (for hymns and for liturgy) in honour of their 50th wedding anniversary. Perhaps you would like to remember or honour someone or mark a significant event?

Care to know more about our new book? Take a look at one of the brochures either on the bulletin board in the narthex or on the coffee table in the Katie Luther room. Complete details concerning our new book are carried at the ELCIC's worship web site www.worship.ca. Simply click on *Evangelical Lutheran Worship*.

Finally, as you may recall from the annual meeting, Trinity will be providing a full kit of new worship books to Waterloo Lutheran Seminary. In fact, they have asked us to participate in a dedication service to take place on Wednesday, November 22. Watch for details!

✚ Call Process Update: No News!

Initially, we were told that we could expect the call process to take at least 6 months. Well, there's little news so far but it is looking increasingly like it may take perhaps a year or more to fill our second position. There is a significant shortage of pastors in the Eastern Synod and a fair number of vacancies.

Early in the process, Pastor Susan Johnson provided us with a list of pastors who might consider a move. The principal criterion was "suitability for team ministry." The Committee has now inquired of a number of people as to their interest in participating in our call process and the list of candidates has been slowly evolving as people confirm interest one way or the other. Clearly, though, we are in no position to proceed to interviews. Recently, Pr. Johnson indicated that we should expect some additional names from outside the Synod.

The Neighbourhood

Simcoe, Maitland, Emily... the three block-long dead-end streets run south like the bars on a capital E, sandwiched between an apartment block on the east, the park on the west, lakefront on the south, and King Street (the upright of the E) on the north. Emily is the most handsome of the three, with its huge classical limestone houses serenely fronting the public face of the park. Simcoe and Maitland are architecturally odder, a mixture of the grand and the peculiar. Maitland has, at its far end, the Kingston Yacht Club, a welter of slightly shabby stucco buildings.

I'd long wanted to explore these streets and I did so a day or two ago, when the weather was so gorgeous as to make walking obligatory. What fascinated me was the tangle of old buildings — ex-stables, mews, storehouses, who knows? — lurking just behind the street-side buildings.

There must be ways of cutting through from one street to another, through yards and gateways. There must be small walled gardens, inner courtyards, grown up mostly by accident and expediency. Whatever this area was, it wasn't planned.

I longed to push open a gate and see where it might lead me; maybe there'd be a laneway into another stable-yard, another gated passage past a limestone wall out onto the next street... But I'm an adult. Adults don't trespass on other people's property. Adults know better than to intrude on other people's privacy. Adults think beforehand of the consequences of pushing into someone else's backyard and the potential for embarrassment if caught. Adults don't take that sort of risk.

It made me want to be a child again, because children can get away with trespass and intrusion; they're supposed to be finding odd ways through tangles of walls and into magical spaces. It's their job. It's their business to find shortcuts and secret ways and hidden passages and secret gardens. Turn a bunch of 8-year-olds loose with encouragement to trespass and within an afternoon, they would have swarmed the area and found every possible way through.

"Blessed are these little ones," Jesus says, and we can take

that any six ways from Sunday. Blessed are the innocent (well, comparatively — anyone who's dealt extensively with five-year-olds knows a thing or two about Original Sin). Blessed are the vulnerable and powerless and fragile. Blessed are those who aren't valued by our society — children in Jesus' time were the lowest of the low, lacking any worth except perhaps to their parents.

But also, perhaps, blessed are those who are fearless and curious, as children can be; blessed are those who light out for the back alleys and push open gates and insist on penetrating the fascinating muddles that adults shun as being too problematic. Children aren't fearless — anything but! — but they have areas of fearlessness compared to adults. They have their notions of propriety, but they aren't the same as ours.

Maybe this isn't such a bad approach to faith. I know it's scary, feeling that we may be getting it wrong and making trouble for ourselves with God; we worry that if we trespass, we won't find forgiveness, only anger. Our God is a God who counts down

from the top and has high expectations; what do you mean, you got A- in math when you could have gotten an A+? We may model our God on the worst of the adults who mattered most to us, parents whom we could never please, neighbours who yelled when we cut across their yard, teachers who were remote and uninterested, grownups who were large and powerful and not always benevolently inclined.

Or, if we're luckier and more hopeful, we have a sunnier and more merciful God, a God of peace and serenity, a God of love and mercy, a God who holds us safely. But is this a God who will let us wiggle down off God's lap and go boldly out in search of snails and garter snakes?

What about a God of mischief? What of a God who might delight in a bunch of 8-year-olds swarming an old neighbourhood, rejoicing in eager exploration? What of a God who might indeed value curiosity and be willing to allow us to take risks, to make mistakes, to get it wrong, to trespass in the eager pursuit of understanding? What sort of God might that be?

Could we have faith in a God who loves us so much that he loves our curiosity? Now that we have indeed gone ahead and eaten of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil, and we've paid the price, perhaps we're supposed to go further, exploring more, using our intelligence, trusting enough to allow ourselves a certain fearlessness. Maybe it's our job to explore our own souls as I'd love to explore this warren of old

buildings, finding out what's connected to where and how it all fits, or doesn't — but above all, to learn, to pry, to discover.

I walk down Maitland Street, wishing I was eight again and able to get away with pushing open that particular gate, ducking down into this courtyard, finding the way through — but I'm grown-up. I know better. I wish I didn't.

✚ Faithful Journey

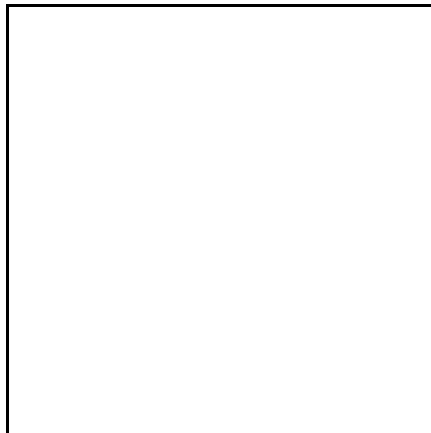
Trinity's Stewardship Task Group has invited one of its members —Rick Ritz— to write a brief column.

The term *steward* is often equated to that of “manager.” In Biblical times, the steward was entrusted to manage the household, including the servants, the master’s possessions, his wealth, and his staff. As stewards of all that we have —our time, our talent and our possessions— we are called upon to use these resources in the best possible way to serve God, ourselves and our community. Therefore, stewardship is an umbrella encompassing every part of our journey through life.

Many people today think of stewardship in terms of raising money. God calls us to be good stewards and to give of our time, talents, and possessions to enhance and promote God’s work and word. This is a far cry from the stuff of fund-raising drives to fix the roof or paint the nave. This is a way of life which challenges us all to look at how we “manage” our time, our talent, and our possessions.

Examples of good stewardship can be seen in many everyday activities. Recycling is one of the modern trends which is simply good stewardship applied to the physical resources of the world around us. Caring for others is another example of how we can practice *stewardship of life* within our family and community.

With good stewardship in mind, we are called upon to give *first fruits* rather than *leftovers*. That may mean a thoughtful decision to volunteer to teach Sunday School, to join a choir, or to sign up as an assisting minister. This proactive decision to lend our time and talent is *good* stewardship. So is making a decision to give a specific percentage of our income to the church, off the top, rather than giving what is left at the end of the month.



This fall, Trinity Church is embarking on a stewardship program with some important, specific goals. We want to ensure that the congregation can properly fund a second pastor before making a commitment to a specific candidate. More than this, we want to enhance the life of the congregation by encouraging careful stewardship on the part of our entire membership. If we can do that, we will have accomplished much, and Trinity will thrive.

In the months ahead, you’ll hear much more about a “faithful journey” and about good stewardship as we move into an every-household visitation program. Make of yours a *faithful journey*. Test your own stewardship by giving more freely of your time, your talent, and your possessions.

Ms. Baumgartel has been featured in numerous CBC radio broadcasts, was a member of Modern Quartet, performs regularly at the Festival of the Sound in Parry Sound, Artspring Festival on Salt Spring Island, BC, and is the founder of the "Festival Within a Festival" chamber music concert series at the Elora Festival. In 2003 she was appointed conductor of the KWS Youth Sinfonia.

The new roof is on the 1957 wing and so far, so good! This project was originally slated for fall, 2005, but foul weather prevented the scheduled start. Funds for this project were raised last year, so we're in good shape in that regard.

To the end of April, we are showing a modest General Fund surplus of \$1,081. The fact that we are only paying a single pastor's salary is keeping us in the black.

The Capital Fund amount of \$17,796 includes \$12,910 held over from 2005 to effect the roof repairs over the 1956 wing. The new roof is in place and has been paid off, leaving a balance of \$3,383.

Look for plaster work to begin shortly in the balcony and new glass doors to be installed at the main entrance within a few weeks. Our regular Capital Fund contributions should cover these two jobs. This fall, we intend to replace the furnace at the parsonage. Again, we expect to have the funds in hand through regular Capital Fund offerings.
